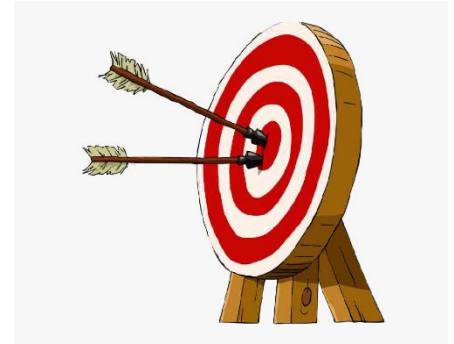

<p><b>NOTE: Under no circumstances should the projectile be removed – stabilize it so that it cannot move and increase damage to tissue.</b>  <b>If the patient has an eye impalement, cover the uninjured eye to reduce risk of movement to the injured eye.</b>  <b>Serious bleeding may also be a major concern.</b></p>					

# Forest Lakes Camp Archery Procedure



1. Archery equipment is to be collected from the office by an adult and only to be used under adult supervision.
2. Shoes must be worn for this activity.
3. Archery is only to be used at the designated area, shooting towards the bank.
4. All participants should wait either in the shelter or outside the roped off area.
5. When loading arrows, ensure that the bow is pointing towards the ground.
6. Once loaded the arrow should only be pointed towards the target.
7. The odd colored flight should always be positioned facing away from the bow.
8. Generally, the dominant hand holds the string with the index finger positioned above the arrow with the middle and ring fingers below.
9. Once all arrows have been fired by all shooters and all bows have been handed to supervisors, the arrows may be collected from the danger zone.
10. When removing arrows from target/ground take hold of the arrow as close to the target/ground as possible, then gently twist the arrow as you pull it out, in the same direction as it entered.
11. Once everybody is out of the danger zone then the next participants can take up their bow for their turn.
12. At no time should anybody have both a bow and arrow in their hands whilst somebody is in the danger zone.

Bows and arrows are always to be supervised by adult, one supervisor per bow.

## HEALTH AND SAFETY REMINDERS



Adults will be required to lead horses and assist with supervision of children. Adults will not be riding horses and at least 1 adult will lead a horse so it is important that adults do not have a fear of horses.

**Please note** the maximum weight limit for horse riding is 80kg. If you have children who are heavier than 80kg it is kinder to leave them at camp to do an alternative activity than have them embarrassed because they may not be able to ride.

### **Supervisors please remind children:**

- 'Closed in' shoes only –NO jandals, sandals or crocs.
- Long pants are recommended for riding, to prevent being scratched on trees etc, also ensure pants are loose enough to mount the horse and sit on a saddle.

- To be quiet and respectful around horses, they are live animals and can be unpredictable if frightened.
- PLEASE NOTE: There are no toilets at the horses - please go before you leave camp.
